





SBB tasks and service levels should be reviewed each year in advance of the budget cycle

SB 854 (Fish & Game Code § 712.1) Overview





How Does SBB Work?

SBB is a budgeting approach that identifies the tasks needed to accomplish the Department's Mission

Task-based

Subject matter experts develop a list of service-specific activities, referred to as tasks, that align with the Mission



Labor-focused

SBB collects labor hours desired per task ("Mission level"), and now spent per task ("current level")



Organized by service

Subject matter experts create task lists for distinct services that represent all of the activities that occur within the Department



Annual process

This SBB version is being designed for FY20-21. SBB tasks and service levels should be reviewed each year in advance of the budget cycle




SBB is a **task based budget** that describes **all services needed** to accomplish Department's **Mission**

Mission

The Department’s services to the public (or internal users) are grouped based on common intended results

Service

Each service breaks specific functions into programs to capture more concrete operational components

Program

Each program is further divided into sub-programs if needed

Sub-program

Each sub-program contains task categories that group together similar tasks

Task category

Distinct tasks show what the department does to accomplish its mission





Data input by Subject Matter Experts	Subject Matter Experts populated mission level <u>labor, frequency, definition of the multiplier input, as well as desired performance level</u> for most tasks. In some cases, task data is updated with appropriate SBB team and program management review.
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Data input by regions and branches	After subject matter experts compiled the tasks, regional and branch staff entered <u>multiplier counts</u> for the mission level, and the <u>current performance data</u> , by position, at the regional and branch level. In some cases, multipliers are updated with appropriate SBB team and program management review.
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Current Service Level Data for Tasks

Current service level data is collected by allocating labor hours of department positions to tasks across the task catalog

Regional and branch staff will assign the working hours of each position in their region/branch to the applicable tasks currently performed by that position



SBB Data Will Inform Future Operations and Budgeting

Initial Phases of SBB Review

*Future Operations and Budget Analysis
Informed by SBB Data*

Service Chart and Task Catalog Development



Data Analysis

SBB data will be used by CDFW to determine the cost of Department tasks at the current level of service and options to reduce the gap in fulfilling the mission level of service.



Revenue Source Analysis

The SBB task catalog will enable the Department to identify existing funding sources supporting particular tasks and gain visibility to tasks that could benefit from a different allowable or more appropriate funding source.



Task Justification

SBB data will provide the justification (i.e., mandate, operational necessity, best practice) for tasks the Department performs.



Service Level Gaps

SBB will identify the gaps between the mission level of service and the current level of service for each task.


Dashboard Analytics Enabled by SBB Data

Interactive reports and dashboards will enable CDFW to track performance metrics and facilitate data-driven decision making



Deep Understanding of SBB Data

- Current service level data and mission level data by service area, program, subprogram, and task will be viewable in the dashboards



Multi-Year Performance Tracking

- SBB data will be able to be tracked across years as data is refreshed annually



Quick Access and Reporting

- Ability to filter the data and save filter views, will assist the department in quickly accessing and reporting SBB progress and data

Preliminary Mission and Current Service Level Data Collection	The Department collected preliminary mission and current service level data for Department tasks for each service area.
Data Validation and Review	Regional Managers, Branch Chiefs, and similar roles validated and submitted service level data for review by the SBB Executive Working Group.
Task Measurement and Performance Calculation	Labor hours per task were compiled in order to meet mission levels of service. Current levels of service was collected through allocation of actual staff time.
Preliminary Data Analysis	A preliminary analysis of the difference between mission and current service levels was conducted for each of the core services and review is ongoing.

Important Notes on CDFW SBB Data Analysis

The CDFW service based data analysis is a point-in-time picture of dynamic data



Annual Review of SBB Data

- Current service level data will be refreshed annually and mission level data will be refreshed every 5 years with annual updates if required
- The data analysis will be re-run annually following SBB data refreshes to continuously understand needs over time



Multidimensional Approach to Reducing the Gap

- Approaches will be developed from a variety of angles, including review of policies and mandates, process and technology improvements, and more




Transparent and Collaborative Process for Final SBB Report

- The final report to the Legislature regarding the SBB review will be informed by a diverse range of internal and external CDFW stakeholders

Mission Level of Service Definition

The SBB mission level under Fish and Game Code section 712.1 encompasses **“the service standards and essential activities required for the department to meet its mission and statutory requirements.”**




CDFW’s SBB mission level is based on existing **statutes, state and federal requirements, department policies, public and stakeholder expectations, the need for scientific rigor, reasonable operations necessary for ecosystem based management and biodiversity conservation, and policy considerations.**

Examining the Gap

Service level gaps represent constraints or challenges in CDFW meeting its mission and do not directly equate to funding or staffing shortages. CDFW will collaborate internally and externally to examine service levels and determine ways to address constraints.

A variety of factors can increase and/or decrease service level gaps

Important Notes on SBB Data

CDFW is a complex organization where many groups must work together to achieve the mission of any given region, branch, or function


What SBB Data Shows:

- **Mission Level:** The full set of tasks and level of effort necessary to meet the Department's mission
- **Current Service Level across CDFW:** All of the groups within CDFW that perform tasks to support CDFW's mission today
- **Gap across CDFW:** The gap to meet CDFW's mission after accounting for all effort devoted to these tasks across CDFW

What SBB Data Does NOT Show:

- **Correct division of labor:** SBB data shows the labor hours spent to support CDFW's mission today. SBB data does **not** necessarily mean additional labor is necessary or show the appropriate organizational division of labor.
- **Gap within an individual region, branch or function:** SBB data shows the size of the gap across CDFW, but SBB data does not show which CDFW region, branch, or function may require additional resources.

Note on Highly Specific Inquiries

SBB is intended to capture data at a material and sustainably trackable level of detail for management decisions; tasks generally are not species-specific.

What SBB Data Shows:

- **CDFW activities at a sustainably trackable and material level of detail:** SBB data was collected at a general level of detail, material to CDFW management and operations.

What SBB Data Does NOT Show:

- **Details beyond documented SBB tasks for any given interest area:** SBB tracks CDFW activities at the level of specificity provided by the task catalog. For sustainability of the SBB process, the task catalog generally does not isolate each specific species, issue, and interest area as a separate task.

Example:

I would like to see data on CDFW's efforts regarding ***interpretive signage about elk.***

This activity is included in the ***Interpretive panels*** task (ID PUB-GEN-REC-PUB-002): ***Research, design, produce, and install interpretive panels.***

Our Desired Performance for this task is that *Visitors increase knowledge and appreciation for site and engage in behaviors that protect resources.* Service level data is also available for this task.

CDFW leadership has assembled teams of subject matter experts and managers to closely review data outliers, such as tasks with notably high mission level hours.

These quality review efforts may result in updates to task information and the gap may fluctuate as a result.



Annual Data Refresh: SBB current service level data will be reviewed and updated annually. The information supporting the 2021 final SBB report to the Legislature may not reflect the data available today.




Services by percent of mission fulfilled by current staff hours



Preliminary Data Analysis By Service Area


Services by greatest to least gap to mission (in hours)















Current perceived constraints/challenges





Justification for desired performance standard






