easier to clean-up on water than light bunkers).

TIME OF SPILL: Monday, October 28, approx. 3:30 p.m. (OES notified 4:34 pm; OSPR notified

by USCG 4:25, then by OES 4:41 pm.)

SUSPECTED CAUSE: Under investigation.

POTENTIAL RESPONSIBLE PARTY (RP): San Francisco Drydock, Inc.

EST. AMOUNT: 1,943 bbl (81,627 gals.) spilled from ship; most contained in the drydock basin

except about 100 bbl (4,200 gals.) went into Bay waters.

RESPONSE: Spill source secured and oil being recovered. Containment boom and sorbent

pads deployed around drydock by SF Drydock emergency response crew. Coast

Guard, Department of Fish and Game Office of Oil Spill Prevention and

Response (OSPR), and four Oil Spill Response Organizations (OSROs) arrived on-scene 10/28/96 to clean-up released product. Coast Guard federalized Clean Bay for on-water clean-up. Skimmers inside containment boom and vacuum trucks working from dock since Monday p.m. Now double-booming spill area. Recovered oil is being put in dedicated on-shore storage tanks. Site Safety Plan

and Incident Action Plan written.

SITUATION: Some of oil escaped initial containment boom, last night. Changing tides

have swept the slick north and south, between approximately Hunter's Point and

the San Francisco Ferry Terminal.

WILDLIFE: OSPR Wildlife Operations and Veterinary Van are on-scene, as are International

Bird Rescue and Research Center (IBRRC) staff. As of 11:00 am, three oiled gulls have been retrieved; up to 100 others may be at risk, as well as some local

cormorants, grebes, pelicans, and harbor seals.

MEDIA: There has been News coverage by KRON-TV (NBC), KGO-TV (ABC), KCRA-

TV, the San Francisco Chronicle, and others; OSPR staff have heard reports on

KCBS/SF and KFBK/ Sacramento Radio.
