What is a California marine protected area (or "MPA")?


An MPA is a type of managed area primarily set aside to protect or conserve marine life and habitats in marine or estuarine waters. California's MPA Network consists of 124 areas with varying levels of protection, and 14 special closures, all designed to help safeguard the state's marine ecosystems. Fishing and collecting are banned at marine reserves such as Carrington Point State Marine Reserve, providing this MPA with the highest level of protection.

One goal for California's MPAs was to strategically place them near each other to form an interconnected network that would help to preserve the flow of life between marine ecosystems. Within that network each MPA has unique goals and regulations, and non-consumptive activities, permitted scientific research, monitoring, and educational pursuits may be allowed.

Why was this location chosen for a state marine reserve?

One of the goals for Carrington Point State Marine Reserve is to protect the surfgrass, sandy seafloor, rocky reef, and extensive kelp forest habitat found at this location, where warm water currents from the tropics and cold water currents from Alaska converge. The resulting rich and varied marine life here includes striped shore crabs and a variety of seabirds such as brown pelicans and double-crested cormorants, which use the rocky seashore for shelter and resting. Señoritas, nudibranchs, and lingcod forage in the reserve's surfgrass beds and kelp forests, while brittle stars and sea cucumbers traverse the sandy seafloor.

Carrington Point State Marine Reserve was established as one of 13 Channel Islands MPAs in 2003, and re-established as part of the statewide MPA Network in 2012. The reserve overlaps a portion of the Channel Islands National Marine Sanctuary and Channel Islands National Park. Placing a state marine reserve here provides very high levels of protection for local marine species and the habitats they use.

Boundary:


This area is bounded by the mean high tide line and straight lines connecting the following points in the order listed:

34° 01.280' N. lat. 120° 05.200' W. long.1; 34° 04.000' N. lat. 120° 05.200' W. long.2; 34° 04.000' N. lat. 120° 01.000' W. long.3; 34° 00.500' N. lat. 120° 01.000' W. long.4; and 34° 00.500' N. lat. 120° 02.930' W. long.6

Permitted/Prohibited Uses:

It is unlawful to injure, damage, take, or possess any living, geological, or cultural marine resource.
