Dear Mr. Bonham:

We are pleased to advise you that \$2,491,005 of Fiscal Year (FY) 2015 Endangered Species Act (ESA) Traditional Section 6 funds are available to your agency pursuant to our Cooperative Agreement. The Cooperative Agreement has been renewed for the current year. Thank you for the information your staff provided for the renewal.

Using both the California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW) and U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (Service) project ranking information, our Service Field Office Section 6 representatives worked closely with their CDFW counterparts to collectively recommend their highest priority projects given the known funding allocation. We hope that you are as pleased with this collaborative approach as we are.

The following is a list of the projects approved for FY 2015 CDFW Traditional Section 6 grants:

Using genetic analyses and population modeling to assess the status, threats, and viability of Yreka phlox (<i>Phlox hirsuta</i>)\$179,602
Characterization and control of sarcoptic mange: an emerging conservation threat to recovery of endangered San Joaquin kit foxes (<i>Vulpes macrotis mutica</i>)\$126,300
The effect of regulation change on anticoagulant rodenticide exposure in the San Joaquin kit fox (<i>Vulpes macrotis mutica</i>) in the Bakersfield area\$43,000
Stabilizing and improving a State and Federal endangered species population of palmate-bracted bird's beak\$174,720
Southwestern willow flycatcher (<i>Empidonax traillii extimus</i>) and least Bell's vireo (<i>Vireo bellii pusillus</i>) monitoring and removal of brown-headed cowbirds (<i>Molothrus ater</i>) on the South Fork Kern River in 2015 and 2016\$143,761
Range-wide giant kangaroo rat (<i>Dipodomys ingens</i>) surveys and monitoring optimization

Restoration, recovery, and monitoring of Sierra Nevada yellow-legged frog (<i>Rana sierrae</i>) in the Sierra Nevada\$205,787
Perennial pepperweed control project to benefit soft bird's-beak and other endangered species and tidal marsh habitat\$116,325
Supporting recovery planning, management, and conservation: evaluating the success of translocating fisher to increase the statewide distribution\$175,000
A translocation and monitoring program for bi-state sage-grouse (<i>Centrocercus urophasianus</i>): rescuing a subpopulation from probable extinction while updating models of demographic performance and conservation planning\$300,000
Assessing the population status of the endemic Clear Lake hitch (<i>Lavinia</i> exilicauda chi) and identifying spawning tributary restoration projects to benefit the species
Merced Natural Reserve vernal pool grassland landscape restoration project\$302,739
Elkhorn Slough Tidal Marsh restoration for the southern sea otter\$301,849
Invasive species control and restoration of water sources for the peninsular bighorn sheep (<i>Ovis canadensis nelsoni</i>) in the Santa Rosa Mountains\$78,487
Invasive rattlebox control on Sacramento River lands

Please prepare an Application for Federal Assistance (Standard Form 424) for each individual project, including all supporting grant documents. Please send the signed original and supporting documents by electronic mail to R8FA_Grants@fws.gov and to karen_jensen@fws.gov.

We may contact your staff to help with the required environmental review associated with these projects. Completion of the grant and compliance documentation will allow the Wildlife and Sport Fish Restoration (WSFR) Program to obligate funds to your agency for costs related to these projects.
