






Unit 2 North needs improved drainage capabilities.



























Some native grasses are holding on in certain areas of the Grizzly Island upland area, and these areas will be avoided and enlarged.

Existing water delivery and drainage system will be upgraded to allow the Department to flood existing wetlands and to irrigate the uplands as needed.

Rank upland and wetland vegetation will be enhanced to provide breeding habitat for waterfowl and many other upland birds, and should provide additional habitat for elk, one of which is just visible in upper right.






Wetlands in the West Family Unit will be renovated to provide additional drainage capabilities.




Windfall Farms, hedgerow will be established to add wildlife value and beneficial insects (for pollination) to property.






