**Report to the Fish and Game Commission
Regarding Findings of Necropsies on Mountain Lions
Taken Under Depredation Permits (2013)**

Submitted in compliance with Section 4807 of the Fish and Game Code

Findings

According to Wildlife Branch depredation submission records (which are as yet incomplete for calendar year 2013), the Department issued 148 depredation permits, resulting in at least 62 mountain lions reported being taken. Of those 62 animals, 28 were necropsied. The Department estimates that there may be six lions awaiting necropsy at the Bay-Delta Region. The fate of the remaining 28 (62-28-6 = 28) lions is not known at this time. It is likely they were not recovered from the field.

The number of mountain lions killed under the authority of a depredation permit and necropsied in the calendar year 2013 can be summarized in the following statements, and supported in Tables 1-3 and Figure 1. During 2013, 57% of depredating mountain lions the Department performed necropsies on were male, and 43% were female (Table 1). Of these lions, 39% were considered adults, on the basis of lions being aged at 4 years or younger; 50% were considered sub-adults; and 11% did not have the age recorded on the report (Table 2). California Department of Fish and Wildlife North Central and Central Regions had the highest rate of depredating lions, with 36% and 43% of depredation incidents occurring in these areas, respectively (Table 3).

The majority of necropsied mountain lion stomach contents contained domestic animals (52%); however, deer and other various contents were observed as well (Figure 1).
