

LICENSED FUR TRAPPERS REPORT
1979-80

A total of 3,237 trapping licenses were sold during the 1979-80 trapping season. This is an increase of 36% from the 2,378 licenses sold in the 1978-79 season and an increase of 387% from the 664 licenses sold eleven seasons ago in the 1969-70 season. This is the first season since the 1920's, when license sales varied between 2,500 and 5,200 that more than 3,000 licenses were sold in a single season.

Legislation enacted in 1974 requires every person who now takes furbearing or nongame mammals for profit to purchase a trapping license. The fees are: \$10 - adult, \$5 - juvenile, and \$25 - nonresident.

Revenue received by trappers from the sale of furs during the 1979-80 season, based on average prices paid by fur buyers at trappers' association fur sales, was \$2,093,268.20. This was the second consecutive year and the second time ever that the reported fur value exceeded \$2,000,000. However, this is a decrease of 13% in revenue from the \$2,399,565.30 realized during the 1978-79 season. Likewise, the average income per trapper decreased 29% from the \$1,741.34 per trapper in 1978-79 to \$1,243.77. But the average income per trapper during the 1979-80 season is the second highest on record.

Each year a portion of the fur sale is reported as unsold. During the 1979-80 season. Unsold pelts still have value, and for the purpose of this report they have the same monetary value as marketed pelts. Therefore, the estimated value of the 1979-80 fur harvest was \$2,259,320 down 15% from the \$2,663,310 of the 1978-79 season.

As has occurred for the four previous seasons, bobcats were the most economically important animals providing fur. Although 7,809 export tags were sold for bobcats taken during the 1979-80 season in a program requiring tags for sale or shipment of bobcat furs, holders of trapping licenses only reported the take of 7,127 bobcats. This is an increase of 3% in the reported take over the 1978-79 season reported take of 6,928 bobcats. The average price paid per bobcat pelts was \$114.20, a decrease of 40% from previous high average of \$190.98 which was paid during the 1978-79 season. The decreased value of the bobcat pelts, despite the slight increase in take, resulted in a decrease of 33% in over-all value of bobcats pelts during the 1979-80 season. Also, this is probably the major cause of the over-all decrease in the total fur value from the 1978-79 season to the 1979-80 season.

The value of muskrats, historically the most important furbearer economically, increased to \$483,480.45 the highest value ever recorded for this species. This was caused by an increase of 27% in the average muskrat fur value and placed muskrat value second only to the value of bobcat fur. The take of gray fox increased by 26% from the previous season and despite the slight drop in average fur value resulted in a record high total fur value for this species of \$431,901.36. The take of the fourth most valuable furbearer, the coyote, increased by 16% from the 1978-79 season but the 42% decrease in fur value caused a decrease in the total fur value from the record high for this species during 1978-79. Decreases in both take and average fur value of raccoon resulted in a 38% decrease in total fur value from the 1978-79 season to the 1979-80 for this species.

Once again, far more muskrats are taken than any other species. Almost 67% of the total take during the 1979-80 season was muskrats, an increase from the 63.8% portion of the take this species represented during the 1978-79 season. The take of all species except badger, mink and raccoon increased during the 1979-80 season over the take of the 1978-79 season.

For the third successive year furs were reported taken in all counties except San Francisco County.
