

## 2021 Marine Region: Area, Staff, and Funding

The Marine Region encompasses approximately 5,767 square statute miles of state waters, including San Francisco Bay and San Pablo Bay to the Carquinez Bridge.

For the 2020-2021 fiscal year, the Marine Region budget was \$28,004,585

As of December 31st, 2021, 148 permanent staff and 80 scientific aids worked within the Marine Region.
