AMENDMENT NO. 2



(A Major Amendment) California Endangered Species Act Incidental Take Permit No. 2081-2017-040-03 California Department of Transportation (Caltrans), District 4 Gleason Beach Roadway Alignment Project, Sonoma County

INTRODUCTION

On July 27, 2018, the California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW) issued Incidental Take Permit No. 2081-2017-040-03 (ITP) to the California Department of Transportation (Permittee) for take of Coho Salmon – South of Punta Gorda (*Oncorhynchus kisutch*), the Covered Species associated with the Gleason Beach Roadway Alignment Project in Sonoma County, California. In issuing the ITP, CDFW found, among other things, that Permittee's compliance with the Conditions of Approval of the ITP would fully mitigate impacts to the Covered Species and would not jeopardize the continued existence of the Covered Species.

On August 5, 2021, CDFW issued ITP No. 2081-2017-040-03 Amendment No.1. The amendment extended the date from which the HM lands package is due to CDFW for review and approval from within 18 months of the effective date of the ITP to within 18 months of the start of Covered Activities, update the security submission due date and update administrative errors within the CEQA Findings section of the ITP.

This amendment (Amendment No.2) seeks to allow Caltrans to install a temporary access bridge comprised of steel beams and timbers constructed on habitat protection mats and span across Scotty Creek. The temporary bridge will be constructed no earlier than June 15, 2022 and removed no later than October 15, 2022. The temporary bridge will be used to transport construction equipment and materials over Scotty Creek during the construction of the State Route 1 bridge. The temporary bridge will be 70 feet long and 24 feet wide and accessed via ramps constructed over the existing habitat protection mats. The bottom of the steel support beam will be 3 feet above the top of Scotty Creek's banks. Temporary k-rails will be installed along each side of each ramp and handrails will be installed along each side of the temporary bridge. A geotextile material will be placed between the ground surface and temporary habitat protection mats to prevent debris from entering Scotty Creek. Construction of the temporary bridge will not require ground disturbing activities to remedy the grade elevation difference between the banks north and south of Scotty Creek. Minor vegetation removal including mowing of grass will be needed to install the temporary bridge. No creek dewatering will be required for the installation and removal of the temporary bridge.

This Major Amendment No. 2 (Amendment) makes the following change to the existing ITP:

Addition of a detailed explanation to the Project Description of a new temporary access bridge.

AMENDMENT

The ITP is amended as follows (amended language in **bold italics**; deleted language in strikethrough):

1. The following paragraph is added to the Project Description

Installation of a Temporary Bridge Over Scotty Creek. A temporary access bridge comprised of steel beams and timbers will be constructed on habitat protection mats and span across Scotty Creek. The temporary bridge will be constructed no earlier than June 15, 2022 and removed no later than October 15, 2022. The temporary bridge will be used to transport construction equipment and materials over Scotty Creek during the construction of the State Route 1 bridge. The temporary bridge will be 70 feet long and 24 feet wide and accessed via ramps constructed over the existing habitat protection mats. The bottom of the steel support beam will be 3 feet above the top of Scotty Creek's banks. Temporary k-rails will be installed along each side of each ramp and handrails will be installed along each side of the temporary bridge. A geotextile material will be placed between the ground surface and temporary habitat protection mats to prevent debris from entering Scotty Creek. Construction of the temporary bridge will not require ground disturbing activities to remedy the grade elevation difference between the banks north and south of Scotty Creek. Minor vegetation removal including mowing of grass will be needed to install the temporary bridge. No creek dewatering will be required for the installation and removal of the temporary bridge.

All terms and conditions of the ITP and MMRP that are not expressly amended herein remain in effect and must be implemented and adhered to by the Permittee.

FINDINGS

Issuance of this Amendment will not increase the amount of take of the Covered Species compared to the Project as originally approved; the amendment proposes to build a temporary access bridge over Scotty Creek and keep it in place from June 15, 2022 to October 15, 2022. It is not expected that this Amendment will increase Project impacts on these species (i.e., "impacts of taking" as used in Fish and Game Code Section 2081, subd. (b)(2)).

Issuance of this Amendment does not affect CDFW's previous determination that issuance of the ITP meets and is otherwise consistent with the permitting criteria set forth in Fish and Game Code section 2081, subdivisions (b) and (c).

<u>Discussion</u>: CDFW determined in July 2018 that the Project, as approved, met the standards for issuance of an ITP under CESA. This determination included findings that, among other things, the impacts of the taking would be minimized and fully mitigated and that the Project would not jeopardize the continued existence of the Covered Species. Those findings are unchanged with respect to this Amendment because the Project and ITP as amended requests only to allow the temporary access bridge to be built and maintained over Scotty Creek from June 15, 2022 to October 15, 2022. Permittee's continued adherence to and implementation of the avoidance and minimization measures set forth in the ITP's Conditions of Approval and MMRP will minimize and fully mitigate impacts of the taking on the Covered Species.

None of the factors that would trigger the need for subsequent or supplemental environmental analysis of the Project under Public Resources Code section 21166 or California Code of Regulations, title 14, sections 15162 and 15163, exist as a result of this Amendment.

Discussion: CDFW issued the ITP in July 2018 as a responsible agency under the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) (Pub. Resources Code, § 21000 et seq.) after, among other things, considering the Negative Declaration certified by the California Department of Transportation, as the lead agency for the Project. As explained in the findings below, CDFW finds for purposes of CESA that this Amendment represents a major change in the Project as originally approved. However, for the reasons explained above, CDFW concludes this Amendment is not a change in the Project that has the potential to create a new significant effect not previously analyzed, a substantial change in the circumstances under which the Project is being undertaken requiring major revisions to previous CEQA documents, or new information of substantial importance. As a result, CDFW finds that no additional subsequent or supplemental environmental review is required by CEQA as part of CDFW's approval of this Amendment.

CDFW finds that this Amendment is a Major Amendment, as defined in California Code of Regulations, title 14, section 783.6, subdivision (c)(5).

<u>Discussion</u>: This Amendment authorizes the building of a temporary access bridge across Scotty Creek from June 15, 2022 to October 15, 2022. This change does not result in additional take of the Covered Species but does, in effect change the project description and cause additional shading, and noise pollution. Therefore, this Amendment will significantly modify the scope or nature of the permitted Project or activity, or the minimization, mitigation, or monitoring measures in the ITP. CDFW has

determined that the change to the ITP constitutes a Major Amendment as defined in California Code of Regulations, title 14, section 783.6, subdivision (c)(5).

The authorization provided by this Amendment is not valid until signed by all parties and returned to CDFW. Digital signatures facilitated by CDFW will be automatically returned and shall comply with Government Code section 16.5.
