Refugio Beach Oil Spill Settlement: South Coast Shoreline Parks and Outdoor Recreation Grants Program Update and Proposed Project Summaries

June 21, 2022

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On 19 May 2015, an underground pipeline ruptured near Refugio State Beach in Santa Barbara, California, spilling over 123,000 gallons of crude oil. Much of the oil flowed down a ravine under Highway 101 and entered the Pacific Ocean. The incident impacted birds, marine mammals, fish, and other species; closed commercial and non-commercial fisheries; and affected recreational uses like camping and beach use. The spill also impacted other human use activities, including research, education, and outreach at the University of California's Coal Oil Point Nature Reserve. Following the spill, the natural resource Trustee agencies (State Trustees), including the California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW), the California State Lands Commission (CSLC), the California Department of Parks and Recreation (CDPR), the Regents of the University of California (UC Regents), as well as the Department of the Interior through the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS), the National Park Service (NPS), the Bureau of Land Management (BLM), and the Department of Commerce through National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA), conducted a Natural Resource Damage Assessment to quantify the injuries to natural resources. The Trustees executed a settlement with the parties responsible for the spill in October 2020.

As part of the settlement for natural resource damages, the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation (NFWF) received more than \$1.7 million on behalf of the State Trustees to fund projects that compensate the public for loss of use and enjoyment of public beaches, parks, and other public or natural resources in areas downcoast of El Capitan State Beach to Long Beach in Los Angeles County. Consistent with the Final Damage Assessment and Restoration Plan for the Refugio Beach Oil Spill, and in accordance with a Memorandum of Agreement among NFWF and the State Trustees, NFWF is implementing the competitive South Coast Shoreline Parks and

Outdoor Recreation Grants Program with oversight by the State Trustees. NFWF is paid administrative fees for implementing the program.

A request for proposals was released on October 18, 2021, with the goal of allocating up to \$1.5 million to projects. Pre-proposals were submitted by local cities, counties, and other public and non-profit entities. The 8 pre-proposals best matching the grant program's funding priorities were selected for full proposal submission. Seven full proposals totaling over \$1.04 million were submitted, and the review of full proposals began on April 6, 2022.

Table 1 below provides a brief description of the 7 full proposals received and currently under consideration for funding through the South Coast Shoreline Parks and Outdoor Recreation Grants Program. While there are many deserving projects, funding the full amount requested will not be possible based on the funding limitations per locale category. Locale categories that received projects exceeding the amount available include: (1) Downcoast of El Capitan State Beach to Coal Oil Point, and (2) Santa Barbara County downcoast of Coal Oil Point Nature Reserve (Table 2). Projects are being evaluated for funding based on their geographic distribution, total funding request, and other evaluation criteria listed in the request for proposals and found in the Final Damage Assessment and Restoration Plan for the Refugio Beach Oil Spill (p.59). Comments on the proposed projects are welcome and should be submitted to Eliza Braendel at RBOSRFP@nfwf.org by July 25, 2022, in order to ensure consideration. The State Trustees will submit the list of projects selected for funding to the Refugio Beach Trustee Council, composed of representatives from USFWS, NOAA, CDFW, CDPR, CSLC, and UC Regents, for concurrence. Thereafter grant recipients will be notified.
