POSITION STATEMENT

The Fish and Wildlife Interpreter II is the full journey level of the series. Incumbents are assigned to this level when they have demonstrated the capacity to perform at a level of expertise that makes a significant contribution to the area interpretive programs. Incumbents work independently and are responsible for the more difficult or varied technical work as evidenced by the fact that they are assigned to a regional wildlife area or ecological reserve over 5,000 acres in use that receives an estimated annual visitorship of over 25,000 nonconsumptive recreationalists and contains critical habitat for listed rare, threatened or endangered species, and critical habitat for large populations of hunted or fished species. They act in a lead capacity over various interpretive projects or permanent intermittent, seasonal employees or volunteers working on those projects; resolve difficult interpretive problems; review wildlife area and ecological reserve development plans; represent the Department at meetings and functions of public, private and professional organizations.

ELIGIBLE LIST INFORMATION

An open eligible list for the Fish and Wildlife Interpreter II classification will be established for the Department of Fish and Wildlife.

Eligibility expires 12 months after it is established. Applicants must then retake the examination to reestablish eligibility. This examination will be administered on a continuous basis. Applicants will have the option of retesting after a 6-month testing period. Competitors choosing to retest and who are successful in the examination will be merged onto the list in order of final score. The highest score takes precedence regardless of examination date.

REQUIREMENTS FOR ADMITTANCE TO THE EXAMINATION

All applicants must meet the minimum qualifications by the application submission date.

MINIMUM QUALIFICATIONS

Qualifying experience may be combined on a proportionate basis if the requirements stated below include more than one pattern and are distinguished as Either "I", "II", or "III", etc. For example, candidates possessing qualifying experience amounting to 50% of the required time of Pattern I, and additional experience amounting to 50% of the required time of Pattern II, may be admitted to an examination as meeting 100% of the overall experience requirement.

Applications and any attached resumes require employment history information including "to" and "from" dates (month/day/year), time base, and if applicable, civil service class titles. Applications and any attached resumes received without this information MAY BE REJECTED because of incomplete information.

Either I

One year of experience in the California state service performing the duties of the class of Fish and Wildlife Interpreter I, Range B.

Or II

Experience: Three years of natural resource management experience, with at least one year of specialized work experience which must have been performing technical work in connection with a major natural resource interpretive program. (Possession of a Doctorate Degree in Interpretation of Natural Resources or a closely related field may be substituted for the required experience; possession of a master's degree may be substituted for the two years of required general experience.) **And**

Education: Equivalent to graduation from an accredited college or university or an equivalent degree approved by the California Superintendent of Public Instruction under the provisions of California Education Code Section 94310(b) with major work in wildlife management, zoology, fisheries management, botany or other related biological science.

EXAMINATION INFORMATION

Training and Experience Questionnaire - Weighted 100%

This examination consists of a Training and Experience Questionnaire and is the sole component of the examination. To obtain a position on the eligible list, you must attain a minimum rating of **70%**.

COMPETITORS WHO DO NOT COMPLETE THE TRAINING AND EXPERIENCE QUESTIONNAIRE WILL BE DISQUALIFIED.

Applicants will be sent a link through email to complete the Fish and Wildlife Interpreter II Training and Experience Questionnaire.

PREPARING FOR EXAMINATION

Below is a list of suggested resources to have available prior to taking the exam.

EMPLOYMENT HISTORY: Employment dates, job titles, organization names and addresses, names of supervisors or persons who can verify your job responsibilities, and phone numbers of persons listed.

EDUCATION: School names and addresses, degree earned, dates attended, courses taken (verifiable on a transcript), persons or office who can verify education, and phone numbers of persons

or offices listed.

TRAINING: Class titles, certifications received, names of persons who can verify your training, and phone numbers of persons listed.

KNOWLEDGE AND ABILITIES

Knowledge of:

1. Methods and techniques involved in conveying knowledge of natural systems to the public.
2. Principles of public interpretation.
3. History of natural resources of California.
4. Wildlife management principles and methods of their application to conservation conditions and problems in California.
5. Methods, materials and equipment used in wildlife habitat management and restoration.
6. Scientific research methods.
7. Accepted techniques for making biological investigations.
8. Fundamentals of statistics.
9. Private and public organizations in California concerned with conservation generally, and natural resource interpretation specifically.
10. Grounds and landscape maintenance practices.
11. Natural resource history features of Department of Fish and [Wildlife] wildlife areas and ecological reserves.
12. Laws, regulations and Department of Fish and [Wildlife] policies relating to conservation and restoration of lands and wildlife resources in California.

Ability to:

1. Plan interpretive exhibits and programs.
2. Plan, organize and conduct interpretive walks and trails.
3. Apply scientific knowledge, methods, and techniques in obtaining, arranging and interpreting data, and in collecting, identifying and cataloging specimens.
4. Establish and maintain cooperative relations with those contacted in the course of the work.
5. Interpret resource concepts to the public.
6. Communicate effectively.
7. Develop innovative solutions to interpretive problems.
8. Prepare written material for reports and publications.
9. Keep necessary records and prepare reports.
10. Maintain landscape and grounds.
11. Organize scientific materials for presentation and address audiences effectively.
12. Plan, organize and direct the work of permanent intermittent and seasonal employees and volunteers.

ADDITIONAL DESIRABLE QUALIFICATION

Academic training beyond the baccalaureate in course work related to interpretation, especially of wildlife management and the biology of native or plant and animal communities; familiarity with audio-visual and photographic techniques and media; willingness to work irregular hours and weekends.

VETERANS' PREFERENCE

Veterans' Preference will be granted to all competitors who are successful in this examination and who qualify for, and have requested, Veterans' Preference through the California Department of Human Resources (CalHR),

GENERAL INFORMATION

For an examination without a written feature, it is the candidate's responsibility to contact the California Department of Fish and Wildlife three weeks after the filing date if he/she has not received his/her notice.

Applications are available at www.jobs.ca.gov/pdf/std678.pdf, California Department of Human Resources (CalHR) offices, local offices of the Employment Development Department and the testing department on this job bulletin.

Remember, Examinations are Competitive: If you possess the entrance requirements stated on this bulletin, you may take this competitive examination; however, you are not assured a place on the eligibility list. Your performance in the examination is compared to established rating criteria. All candidates who pass are ranked according to their scores.

Candidates needing special testing arrangements due to a disability must mark the appropriate box on the application and/or contact the testing department.

General Qualifications: Candidates must possess essential personal qualifications including integrity, initiative, dependability, good judgment, and ability to work cooperatively with others; and a state of health consistent with the ability to perform the assigned duties of the class. A medical examination may be required. In open examinations, investigation may be made of employment records and personal history and fingerprinting may be required.

Eligible Lists: Eligible lists established by competitive examination, regardless of date, must be used in the following order: 1) sub-divisional promotional, 2) departmental promotional, 3) multi-departmental promotional, 4) service-wide promotional, 5) departmental open, 6) open. When there are two lists of the same kind, the older must be used first. Eligible lists will expire in one to four years unless otherwise stated on the bulletin.

Veterans' Preference: Will be awarded in this examination, pursuant to Government Code Section 18973.1, effective January 1, 2014, as follows: (1) Any veteran, widow or widower of a veteran, or spouse of a 100 percent disabled veteran, who achieves a passing score in an entrance examination, shall be ranked in the top rank of the resulting eligibility list. Any veteran who has been dishonorably discharged or released is not eligible for veterans' preference. (2) An entrance examination is defined, under the law, as any open competitive examination. (3) Veterans' Preference is not granted once a person achieves permanent civil service status.
