

2022 Marine Region: Area, Staff, and Funding

The Marine Region encompasses approximately 5,767 square statute miles of state waters, including San Francisco Bay and San Pablo Bay to the Carquinez Bridge.

For the 2021-2022 fiscal year, the Marine Region budget was \$30,050,801

As of December 31st, 2022, 155 permanent staff and 81 scientific aids worked within the Marine Region.

- Four state regulatory packages completed.
- 72 reports and four public comment letters were submitted in support of federal regulatory activities.
- **2,219** otoliths have been collected by groundfish staff for use in future stock assessments.


