

Background

- Current regulations allow:
 - Bag and possession limit of three fish north of Point Sur,
 Monterey County
- 2023 salmon fishery closure






Data Considerations

- Recreational effort
- Environmental factors






Recreational Halibut Catch





Recreational Fishery Effort Shifts





Environmental Factors


- Minimum size limit
- Cold water since mid-2020
- 3-4 year recruitment lag after water warms
- Last good recruitment documented mid-2019





Regulatory Proposal

- Goal: lessen fishing pressure to promote sustainability
- Reduce daily bag and possession limit to two fish north of Point Sur, Monterey County
- Bag limit reduction could save
 13% (~7,500 fish)





Outreach

- Requests from Commercial Passenger Fishing Vessel (CPFV) operators and recreational anglers
- Marine Management News blog announcing the proposal
- Tribal notification



Presentation Summary

- Recommendation: Daily bag and possession limit reduction from three to two fish
- Expected to promote sustainability of halibut population and fisheries
