Re: Suspension or Revocation of Lake and Streambed Alteration Agreements

Economic & Fiscal Impact Statement

Box A.1.h

The Department of Fish and Wildlife is not aware of any private sector cost impacts because of the proposed action. The purpose of the proposed action is to establish a procedure for suspending or revoking a final lake or streambed alteration (LSA) agreement in accordance with Fish and Game Code Section 1612. Only an entity that has obtained an LSA agreement from the Department and are not in compliance with the agreement, or if the entity has a long-term agreement, fails to provide timely status reports may be affected by the proposed action by having their agreement suspended or revoked.
