

California Fishing Passport



The 2006 Kid's Summer Challenge is a series of fishing events developed just for kids age 15 and under (see right). Each event provides an opportunity for kids to get outdoors and enjoy a day of fishing. Kids record their catches on the following pages, and earn stamps for each fish they catch!

Adults are also welcome and strongly encouraged to attend the events with their kids. Loaner rods and reels will be available for those who need them. **Permission from parents or guardians is required for all loaners.**

The Kid's Summer Challenge provides a sneak peek into the upcoming California Fishing Passport Program, which is set to debut Jan. 1, 2007.

As part of the program, California Fishing Passports will be distributed free of charge to anglers purchasing their 2007 California sport fishing licenses, and to children under 16 years of age, upon request. The passport will list a wide selection of sport fish that occur in California. Also available will be fish identification books, maps, and other helpful information. Incentives and awards will be offered to encourage fishing and to recognize anglers for various levels of personal achievement.

California Pier Fishing!






California High Sierra Fishi



Did you know that it's possible to have a lifetime of fishing adventures... but only if you fish responsibly, and help to protect the environment? By following these simple fishing rules, you'll be doing your part as a Summer Challenge Angler!

Respect the rights of others who use the resource

Never litter or pollute the waters

Share knowledge with others

Know and follow fishing and boating regulations

Release unwanted or undersized fish carefully and unharmed

Never waste fish

Respect other anglers' rights


Keep only the fish you will use



Practice CPR (catch, photograph, and release) whenever possible

Here are some Quick Tips on How To Release a Fish:

- Use wet hands when handling the fish.
- Do not squeeze the fish or touch its eyes or gills.
- · Only remove hooks that can be easily removed. Clip the line near the mouth on deeply hooked fish.
- Remove the hook quickly. Underwater unhooking and release is preferred.
- Avoid having the fish hit the deck of the boat or flop around on the shore.
- · Gently move the fish forward and backwards in the water until it swims away on its own.
