What are Marine Protected Areas?

Marine protected areas (MPAs) are marine or estuarine waters set aside primarily to protect or conserve marine life and its associated habitat. MPAs have varying levels of protections and allowed activities, with special regulations in addition to general fishing regulations.

Types of MPAs

California uses three main MPA classifications: State Marine Reserve (SMR), State Marine Conservation Area (SMCA) and State Marine Park (SMP). The central California region also includes a State Marine Recreational Management Area (SMRMA).

Central California MPAs

Major revisions and additions to Central California MPAs went into effect on September 21, 2007. The 28 MPAs and one SMRMA now encompass 207 square miles (close to 18 percent) of state waters in the Central California region. Of those, about 86 square miles are designated as "no-take" SMRs. Central California MPAs are part of a statewide MPA network that extends all along the California coastline.



In 1999, California's Marine Life Protection Act was passed into law with a clear mandate: to re-evaluate all existing marine protected areas (MPAs) and potentially design new MPAs with input from a broad array of stakeholders. The California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW) was integral to this effort. The MPAs in this brochure were designed, in part, to:

- Protect and sustain marine life, habitats, and ecosystems
- Provide opportunities to learn from and enjoy marine areas subject to reduced human disturbance

Edward F. Ricketts Recreational take of finfish by hook-andline only is allowed. Commercial take of giant kelp and bull kelp by hand is allowed.

Pacific Grove Marine Recreational take of finfish is allowed. Gardens, Carmel Bay Commercial take of giant kelp and bull kelp by hand is allowed.

Point Lobos, Big Creek Recreational and commercial take of salmon and albacore is allowed. Commercial take of spot prawn is allowed.

Point Sur, Piedras Recreational and commercial take of Blancas, Point Buchon salmon and albacore is allowed.

Cambria Recreational take is allowed. (also a State Marine Park)

White Rock Commercial take of giant kelp and bull kelp is allowed.

Morro Bay North of latitude 35° 19.700' N only: Recreational take of finfish, commercial oyster aquaculture, and storing finfish taken outside of the SMRMA for bait purposes is allowed.
