

Department of Fish and Wildlife Stakeholder Survey Options for Recreational Abalone Fishery Regulations

The Department manages abalone to provide for a productive and sustainable fishery. To this end, the Department conducts annual field surveys to assess the health of the resource and track changes in density. Recent surveys have shown downward trends which have reached management triggers set forth in the Abalone Recovery and Management Plan (ARMP). Accordingly, the Department is considering ways to scale back the fishery to improve the health of the resource and reduce the risk of overfishing. Changes to the existing regulations would become effective in 2014. Two management actions are mandated for consideration based on the density triggers reached: 1) Reduce overall red abalone fishery take by 25 percent; 2) Close Fort Ross to allow for recovery in that area. The Department is seeking constituent input to help inform the development of recommendations for the Fish and Game Commission.
