Contingency Plan:

If an emergency occurs, "Call 911" then assign a person to communicate & coordinate with incoming resources, all hunting will cease until the incident is cleared. There will be DFW personnel on site at all times during the event to coordinate emergency and safety situations. An individual, with a four wheel drive pickup and communication capabilities, will be assigned as a safety person and will be ready to respond to any incident. WLP will be immediately notified of any hunting accident; as soon as practical DFW personnel listed as emergency contacts, on this plan, shall be notified of any incident. Any DFW employee, Hunter Education Instructor or other participant may stop the hunt for safety reasons, rain, fog etc. These hunts are for educational purposes and need to take place under ideal conditions. Any conditions that may jeopardize the safety of the hunters or event staff will require the hunt to be cancelled; or if in progress, stopped immediately. If the conditions persist, that hunt period will be cancelled.

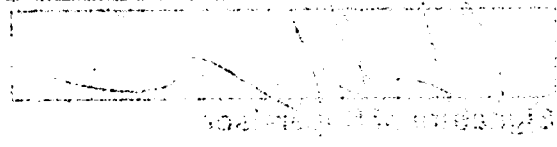
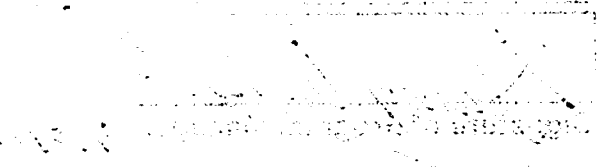
Unit 1 - Matter and Energy
Lesson 1 - Matter and Energy

1. Matter is anything that has mass and takes up space. It is made of tiny particles called atoms and molecules. Matter can be solid, liquid, or gas. Solids have a definite shape and volume. Liquids have a definite volume but no definite shape. Gases have neither a definite shape nor a definite volume. Matter can change from one state to another. This is called a change of state. For example, ice melts to form water, and water evaporates to form steam. Changes of state are caused by heating or cooling. Heating adds energy to the particles, making them move faster and further apart. Cooling removes energy, making them move slower and closer together.

2. Matter is made of tiny particles called atoms and molecules. These particles are very small and cannot be seen with the naked eye. They are held together by forces of attraction. The forces of attraction are stronger in solids and weaker in liquids and gases.

Hunt Plan Overview

This hunt plan was developed to facilitate communication between hunt leaders and regional staff regarding special hunts. The information throughout the plan is based upon the statewide **Policy and Definitions for Upland Game Bird Stamp Fund Apprentice and Special Hunt Events** developed with the Upland Game Bird Program and the Wildlife Program Branch.

Program Directives

- The Department will develop and implement programs that provide **Apprentice Hunters** with an educational, controlled and safe setting to learn hunting skills and further develop hunter safety and a sense of hunter ethics. These Apprentice Hunts will provide beginning hunters throughout California with a field hunting experience incorporating principles of hunter safety and ethics, and wildlife management.
- The Department will develop and implement programs that provide public hunting opportunities for wild upland game birds on private and public lands.

Site Selection

The number of participants at any one time should be limited by the size of the site. Guidelines for game birds are established at one participant and escort per 10 acres. Spacing should be adequate to create a quality hunting experience.

The ideal site configuration is a number of separate parcels rather than one large parcel (i.e., ten 40-acre fields rather than one 400-acre open area).

Safety Issues

Adult supervision is required for all junior hunters. Ideally, escorts will be licensed and will be family members. No more than a 2:1 ratio of hunters to escorts may be used in a junior event. Attending escorts or non-shooters must stay in close proximity to the special hunt participant.

A hunter safety briefing will be provided to all participants (hunters, escorts and volunteers) immediately prior to each hunt event. The briefing will cover safety guidelines established for the specific hunt area as well as general hunter safety items. At a minimum, the briefing will include a review of the Ten Commandments of Hunting, a discussion of zones of fire, hunt area boundaries, shooting rules, and gun handling (guns cased and in vehicle unless hunting).

Media Issues and Access to Hunts

The Regional Hunt Coordinator is responsible for issuing press releases to major newspapers and outdoors publications and for distributing applications and information from the regional headquarters.

Hunt leaders are responsible for issuing press releases to local papers and for distributing cards to license vendors and Hunter Safety Instructors.

Volunteer Coordination

All volunteers shall become non-paid employees of the state (mainly for purposes of worker's compensation benefits) by completing Volunteer Service Agreement forms.

Each hunt leader is responsible for recruiting, training, supervising and recognizing the efforts of his/her volunteers.
