W-MANAGEMENT-Eldorado-Fish

Reference is made to your memorandum of May 10, 1951 regarding material removal from Taylor Creek.

The work contemplated is to be done by the Forest Service, or their contractors, in regard to borrow material for fill construction for project #1207. There is, however, no thought of "channelizing" the Creek. The material needed will come from a built up gravel bar immediately above the bridge and to the north of the existing stream channel. Since the flood last November almost washed away the Fish Hatchery at this location, it was proposed that in connection with the material borrowed, a protective dike could be raised along that side of the creek, which would also assist in forcing the stream in better alignment with the bridge.

This proposition was discussed with Mr. A. F. Pollitt, Assistant Supervisor of Fish Hatcheries, Bureau of Fish Conservation, State Division of Fish and Game, and there was no serious objection at the time of discussion. We have made two attempts to meet with them on the ground, but they have been unable to keep either appointment.

The work is planned with a minimum of disturbance, and it is to be regretted that a distorted version of the project has been reported to you.
