# Welcome to Salton Sea Refuge

Salton Sea National Wildlife Refuge in south central California was established in 1930 for the preservation of wintering habitat for waterfowl and other migratory bird species. The Refuge is administered by the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service of the Department of the Interior and includes about 33,000 acres.

## A Salty Habitat Supporting Over 400 Species of Wildlife

The Salton Sea is the largest saline lake in California. It covers over 380 square miles. It varies from 9-15 miles wide and is 35 miles long and includes 115 miles of shoreline. It is 40 feet deep and the current level is 226 feet below sea level. The salinity of the Sea—39 parts per thousand—is 10 percent saltier than the Pacific Ocean. The Sea is surrounded by a series of mountains on the north, west and east and intensively farmed agricultural lands in the south.

Habitat types include desert scrub, freshwater marshes, mudflats, alkaline shoreline and deepwater areas, highly irrigated farmlands, and mesquite lined tree coverstrips. Each of these habitat types supports its own particular wildlife species. Over 400 wildlife species use the Refuge areas.

# **Enjoying the Refuge's Wildlife**

The study of wild animals in their natural habitats has become increasingly popular with many people. Viewing of wildlife can be greatly enhanced by a pair of binoculars or spotting scope and a good wildlife/birding guide.

Wildlife species in this brochure have been grouped into four categories: Birds, Mammals, Reptiles and Amphibians, and Fish.

#### **Birds**

Bird populations vary greatly in numbers and species according to seasons. Heavy migrations of waterfowl, marsh and shorebirds occur during spring and fall with many species remaining to nest on the Salton Sea shoreline. Throughout the mild winter and spring a wide variety of smaller birds and birds of prey are present. They are attracted to the freshwater marshes and riparian habitat along the New and Alamo rivers. The best opportunity to observe the greatest diversity of bird life on Salton Sea is from November to May.

The following list contains 356 species that have been recorded on the Salton Sea and the adjacent Imperial Valley. It is not considered final as observations by many people continue to add to the list. This list uses common names in accordance with the 1982 A.O.U. check list and its supplements.

When looking at a bird, pay close attention to characteristics such as color, size, shape, wing and head markings. Always observe first and then refer to your identification book because the bird may not remain where it can be readily observed for a long period of time. This is especially true of perching birds.
