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REPORT OF THE 1975 GAME TAKE HUNTER SURVEY

Hunter game take questionnaires were mailed to 20,566 hunting licensees in January and early February 1976. Two follow-up mailings were made to non-respondents; the first approximately four weeks and the second approximately seven weeks after the initial mailing. One thousand one hundred ninety five questionnaires were returned undelivered making a total possible response of 19,371. This was a randomly selected sample of 3.1 percent of the estimated 617,000 hunting license purchasers in 1975.

Fifteen thousand nine hundred seventy five usable questionnaires were returned; a response of about 82 percent. The sample indicated that there was hunting effort by about 550,200 hunting licensees who spent some 8,251,700 days in the field.

Nineteen seventy five was the first year that follow-up questionnaires were sent to nonrespondents. The primary purposes of the "follow-ups" were to increase response percentage and alleviate nonresponse bias. Nonresponse bias is a phenomenon based on the fact that individuals who were most successful (e.g. hunters) are more apt to return a questionnaire than individuals who were not successful or did not participate. By sending follow-ups, a large percentage of these original nonrespondents do return their questionnaires. This bias has been shown to be one of the principle causes of inflated bag and hunter use figures in surveys of this type. Because follow-ups may significantly reduce take and use figures, the results from the 1975 Hunter Survey should not be directly compared with previous years data as an indication of game bag trends. Instead, the 1975 survey should be considered an improved survey, producing data with greater reliability which may be used as a more accurate base for determining future seasonal variations and long-range trend values.

HUNTING REGULATION CHANGES

Turkeys

Alameda, Contra Costa, Madera, Marin, Mariposa, Napa, San Benito, San Mateo, Sonoma and Tuolumne counties were added to the spring turkey season. The length of the spring season was increased by one week over the previous year and the bag limit was increased from one to two birds per season.

Madera, Mariposa and Tuolumne counties were added to the fall turkey season. Alameda County was dropped from the fall season.

Tree Squirrels

Tree squirrel season was lengthened in Butte County to coincide with the season in the remainder of the state.

Jackrabbits

The counties of Imperial, Inyo, Los Angeles, Riverside, San Bernardino and a portion of Kern were closed to jackrabbit hunting from February 2 to August 31.

Deer

That portion of the state included in the northeastern deer season in 1974, was designated "Zone X" for 1975. A special Zone X tag was required for those wishing to hunt in the northeastern region. Purchasers of general deer tags could not hunt in Zone X and those purchasing Zone X tags could not hunt in the remainder of the state.

Wild Pigs

The Department's Tehama Wildlife Area was closed to the taking of wild pigs from January 1 to March 31.

Ducks

The statewide bag limit was set at seven ducks. Daily bags could not include more than two redheads or canvasbacks, singly or in the aggregate. An exception was the San Francisco Bay-Suisun area where daily bags could not include more than one canvasback. In the Colorado River area, the season opened and closed one week later than in 1974.

Geese

The Colorado River zone had a split season for geese in 1975. The bag and possession limit in this area was reduced to five of which three had to be white and two, dark species. In the counties of Del Norte, Humboldt and Mendocino there was no open season for Canada geese in 1975. Areas of both the Sacramento Valley and San Joaquin Valley had special closures on Canada geese. In portions of the Sacramento Valley, the open season for the taking of Canada geese was from December 15 to January 18. In portions of the San Joaquin Valley the open season was from October 18 to December 14.

It is of importance to realize that there are still statistical biases inherent in the hunter survey and until these biases are eliminated, the principal value of the total bag figures extracted from this report will be the indication of game bag trends. The respondents to this survey represent about 2.6 percent of the total hunting license buying public; consequently, those species of game which attract the smallest number of hunters tend to be more seriously affected by sampling bias and the results may or may not be valid from year to year. The primary use of this survey will be to compare this season with next season and in the future determination of long-range trends.

The estimated total hunting license sales divided by the number of questionnaires returned, provided the projection factor for calculating total figures. The projection factor used for the 1975-76 hunting season calculations was $617,000 \div 15,975 = 39$.

Pheasant populations were generally down from 1974. After two successive years of very high production rates, populations dropped to near normal in the principal producing areas of the state. The Sacramento Valley accounted for 42 percent of the statewide bag. The San Joaquin Valley accounted for 35 percent.

The third consecutive year of high production rates, especially in the southern portion of the state, provided for an excellent overall bag in 1975. Production was improved in most areas of the state because of good feed, water and cover conditions.

The southern portion of the state provided excellent dove hunting in 1975. The two geographical units comprised of the southern San Joaquin Valley and the area south of the Tehachapi Mountains accounted for over 64 percent of the statewide dove bag. The take in most northern areas was down considerably due to early rains and cold weather in that portion of the state.

The generally low pigeon harvest in 1975 was partially attributed to the birds being widely scattered throughout their range due to an abundance of feed. The northern California counties of Humboldt, Mendocino, Shasta and Siskiyou did provide fair hunting and accounted for 22 percent of the statewide bag. The south coastal counties of Monterey, San Luis Obispo and Santa Barbara accounted for 18 percent of the overall take.

Contributing to the duck harvest in 1975 was the fact that rainfall was extremely low during the fall and early winter months. No flooding of the river bypasses or low lying areas occurred. As a result, birds were concentrated on the managed waters and were more available to hunters.

Improved forage conditions resulting from the third consecutive year of above average rainfall, especially spring rain, was reflected by an increased deer take in 1975. The deer take as measured by tag returns showed a 14 percent increase from the 1974 figures. Though the hunter survey figures are lower than the 1974 survey, this is a result of an improved survey providing more accurate data rather than a decrease in the actual deer harvest.

There were about 33,100 archery deer hunters reported for 1975. The archery deer take as measured by tag returns increased 17 percent over 1974.

Due to inadequate sampling procedures in the hunter survey as it relates to bear hunters, a separate survey of bear hunters was initiated in 1973 and continued in 1974. Those surveys produced reliable information by adequately sampling the bear hunter population and eliminating nonresponse bias. The 1974 survey indicated a bear take of 1,051. The survey was conducted again for the 1975 season. Results are not yet available.
