

LICENSED FUR TRAPPERS REPORT

1970-71

A total of 631 trapping licenses was sold in the 1970-71 fur trapping season, a decrease of 5.0 percent from the 664 licenses sold in 1969-70.

Success in trapping effort was reported by 226 trappers in 1970-71. This represents a decrease of 21.0 percent from the 286 trappers who reported trapping effort in 1969-70.

Revenue received by trappers from the sale of furs in 1970-71 amounted to \$55,932.87. This represents a decrease of 26.2 percent below the \$75,835.48 reported for the 1969-70 season. The average income per trapper in 1970-71 was \$247.49. This is a decrease of 6.6 percent from \$265.00 per trapper in 1969-70.

Each year a portion of fur catch is unsold. For the purpose of this report, these unsold pelts have monetary value, based on the average statewide price per pelt for each species. Therefore, the estimated value of 1970-71 fur catch was \$57,732.72, a decrease of 28.4 percent from the 1969-70 estimated value of \$80,675.00.

Muskrats, as in the past, were first on the list both in number of pelts taken and revenue received for pelts. The 1970-71 reported catch of 46,742 muskrats represents 94.0 percent of the total fur catch for the season of 49,736 animals. Muskrat catch was down 9.3 percent from the catch of 51,525 reported for 1969-70. Revenue received for muskrat pelts in 1970-71 was down 7.5 percent from the \$49,576.13 received by trappers in 1969-70. Average price received for muskrat pelts was \$.99, up 2.1 percent from \$.97 in 1969-70.

Of the other furbearers, which represents 6.0 percent of the total fur catch, fox showed the greatest increase in value - 6.4 percent in average pelt price (\$2.67) over the 1969-70 price of \$2.51. Value of bobcat pelts (\$10.86) also showed a slight increase of 2.6 percent over the \$10.58 paid in 1969-70. Excepting muskrat, bobcat, fox and spotted skunk, all other furbearers reflected reduced fur prices. Numbers of mink and beaver pelts were down 60.0 and 58.6 percent respectively from 1969-70. Average prices received for mink and beaver pelts were down 50.4 and 43.7 percent respectively from 1969-70.
