

LICENSED FUR TRAPPERS REPORT  
1974-75

A total of 1,172 trapping licenses were sold in the 1974-75 fur trapping season. This is an increase of 33% from the 878 licenses sold in 1973-74 and an increase of 72% from the 682 sold in the 1972-73 trapping season.

Legislation enacted in 1974 requires every person who now takes furbearing or nongame mammals for profit is required to procure a trapping license for which the fee is for an adult \$10, juvenile \$5 and nonresident \$25.

Revenue received by trappers from the sale of furs in 1974-75, based on average prices paid, was \$282,104. This represents an increase of 24% above the \$227,403 reported for the 1973-74 season. The average income for successful trappers in 1974-75 was \$687. This is an increase of 19% from the \$575 per trapper in 1973-74.

Each year a portion of the fur catch is unsold. During the 1974-75 season and 1973-74 season 45% of the catch was unsold. For the purpose of this report unsold pelts have monetary value based on average prices paid per pelt. Therefore, the estimated value of the 1974-75 fur catch was \$301,400 an increase of 26% from the 1973-74 estimated value of \$239,000.

Muskrats were the most economically important pelt. The 1974-75 reported catch of 64,444 muskrats represents 87% of the total fur catch. The number of muskrats taken was 26% above the 51,072 reported for the 1973-74 trapping season. The average price paid for muskrat pelts was \$2.45, an increase of 8% for the price paid in 1973-74.

Other species of furbearer represented 13% of the total reported catch. The numbers of beaver, opossum, striped skunk, and weasel trapped during the 1974-75 season were down from the 1973-74 season 19%, 23%, 29%, and 43% respectively. An increase in the numbers of badger, coyote, and mink taken were up 70%, 19%, and 22% respectively.

No furbearers were reported taken in Santa Cruz, San Mateo, San Francisco, Orange, Marin, Kings, Calaveras and Amador counties.
