

LICENSED FUR TRAPPERS REPORT  
1976-77

A total of 1,692 trapping licenses were sold in the 1976-77 fur trapping season. This is an increase of 82% from the 931 licenses sold in 1975-76 and an increase of 44% from the 1,172 sold in the 1974-75 trapping season.

Legislation enacted in 1974 requires every person who now takes furbearing or nongame mammals for profit to purchase a trapping license. The fees are \$10 adult, \$5 juvenile and \$25 nonresident.

Revenue received by trappers from the sale of furs in 1976-77 based on average prices paid by fur buyers was \$855,314.00. This represents an increase of 19% from the \$719,431.00 reported for the 1975-76 season (Table 1). The average income for successful trappers in 1976-77 was \$1,088. This is a decrease of 11% from the \$1,221 per trapper in 1975-76.

Each year a portion of the fur harvest is reported unsold. During the 1976-77 season 5% was unsold, about the same as last season. For the purpose of this report unsold pelts have the same monetary value as sold pelts. Therefore, the estimated value of the 1976-77 fur harvest was \$895,603, an increase of 24% from the \$767,437 for 1975-76.

Bobcat, for the second successive year, was the most economically important animal providing fur. The 3,618 bobcat taken is 64% more than last season's 2,203 and represents 4.4% of the 1976-77 catch. The average price paid for bobcat pelts was \$76, a 33% decrease from the \$113.50 paid in 1975-76. This resulted in a drop of 6% in the total revenue provided by bobcat fur.

Muskrats accounted for 72% of the total harvest. However, the 59,076 muskrats taken is only 19% fewer than the 1975-76 season despite severe drought conditions throughout the state. The average price paid for muskrat pelts was \$4.25, an increase of 47% from the \$3.20 paid in 1975-76.

Other furbearers represented 23.6% of the total reported harvest (Table 2). Spotted skunk is the only species other than muskrat with a smaller harvest this season than last season. The increased harvest of the other species noted this season was: badger 179%, beaver 41%, coyote 59%, gray fox 104%, mink 4%, opossum 43%, raccoon 66%, striped skunk 57%.

No furs were reported taken in Orange and San Francisco counties.
