SUBJECT: Glenn-Colusa trout stream report

Enclosed are two copies of a report entitled, A Survey of Stony Creek, Grindstone Creek, and Thomas Creek Drainages in Glenn, Colusa, and Tehama Counties, Calif. This survey was made at the instigation of Mr. Alan Taft in connection with a proposed hatchery in that area. The report is not as polished as it might be but it was thought desirable to submit it at the earliest possible date in order that additional field work may be carried out this season if necessary.

The following streams mentioned in a letter dated May 10, 1946 from A. C. Taft to Brian Curtis are not included in the report for the reasons given.

Line Creek- not located

Trout Creek-not investigated. This stream is tributary to Gold Creek, mentioned under Little Stony Creek, which was dry at its mouth. The entire stream is 3 miles long and possibly contains some trout water.

Hog Wallow Creek-not located. This stream is possibly synonymous with Dark Hollow or Bear Wallow Creeks, neither of which were examined.

Briscoe Creek-not examined. A reliable informant had ridden across the only point that could feasibly be reached on foot and found it dry. He added that it was dry at this point every year. (see survey blank).

Several streams not mentioned in the letter cited above were surveyed because they seemed to be of importance in the area.

In considering the Plaskett Meadows rearing pond site, it should be born in mind that the streams tributary to the Eel River on the other side of the divide could be stocked from a base here. These are steelhead streams and at present are stocked with rescued fish.
