## California Department of Parks and Recreation Summary of California State Parks Coastal Units in the North Coast Region April 14, 2010

This document with a table of California State Parks coastal units in the north coast was created to assist MLPA North Coast Regional Stakeholder Group (NCRSG) members in developing MPA proposals. The table contains information pertinent to each California State Park unit located adjacent to the coast in the study region and is based on State Park statistical reports, unit general plans, as well as conversations with staff in the two districts within the planning region.

The first column of the table gives an approximation of the length of coastline included in the unit, as well as the number of terrestrial acres within. The numbers in the "visitor attendance" column are based on an estimate of visitor numbers during the 2007 – 2008 fiscal year and reflect relative numbers only. "Unit purpose" was articulated based on unit general plans, the California Public Resource Code, and conversations with each district; it is meant to be short and concise. Since much of the interpretation in a unit is based from a visitor center, there is a column indicating whether one is present at each unit. The next column indicates what types of facilities or other features are present for the use of visitors, while the column for educational programs indicates which units offer educational programs by California State Parks on a regular basis; there are also notes on what type of educational programs are offered in the "Comments" column.

The "common recreation" column represents what types of recreation are usually engaged in by visitors, though this column cannot be comprehensive. For instance, the term "diving" includes all underwater recreation, both consumptive and nonconsumptive types. Existing marine managed areas (MMAs) at California State Park units show the names and designations of MMAs adjacent to park units, with the managing agency in parentheses. Those units managed by the California Department of Parks and Recreation (DPR) have an existing lease with the California State Lands Commission, and are in essence part of the California State Park unit itself.

The column labeled "UW Parks Plan Recommendation" was added to satisfy stakeholder interest that was articulate during the March 24 – 25 NCRSG meeting. In this column are the names of MMAs that were recommended in a 2003 California State Parks report on MMAs. The recommendations are based upon years of work by the Underwater Parks Program, which included underwater inventories by the California State Parks dive team and marine biologists. Because these areas were only recommendations, the MMAs were not planned for implementation without further consultation with districts and approval by the State Park and Recreation Commission. All such planning halted when California State Parks began participation in the MLPA Initiative in 2005. This information is offered to the NCRSG for the purpose of assisting in understanding some of the values California State Parks has placed in marine areas offshore its parks, but it does not constitute a proposal by California State Parks.
